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A Guide to the Meeting Events

Plenary Sessions consist of invited presentations that feature the themes of the Annual Meeting and represent salient current and/or controversial issues in the field.

Brief Presentations gather several speakers (generally two or three) to give mini-presentations on their clinical work or research activity. Presentations are broadly grouped by a common theme and are facilitated by a moderator.

Interest Groups provide an ongoing opportunity for members to discuss new developments in their particular area of focus. Each interest group welcomes new members in order to enrich and enliven the discussion.

Institutes have been offered since the early 1990s in order to provide a setting for men and women to meet separately and discuss issues particular to their gender within AFTA and in their profession. This year, there will be a joint Gender Institute, open to all AFTA members, as an opportunity for sharing our narratives about gender's influence in our lives and deepening our relationships to each other. The Men's Institute will be held during lunchtime on Saturday to maintain the continuity of men's connections in that forum.

Forums provide an opportunity to discuss significant issues related to social policy, cultural and economic diversity, social justice, and larger systems. The specific forums may vary from year to year. Each forum has a particular topic area on which a brief presentation is given, followed by ample time devoted to discussion by forum participants.

Networking Conversations have been developed for mutual support and to assist people who are often marginalized to connect with one another and to discuss issues of common interest.

The **Poster Session** features researchers and other individuals using poster illustrations to present their work in an informal setting conducive to in-depth discussion. Types of posters will include research on larger systems and training.

Book Signing is a time to meet AFTA authors. Plan to come to the book signing event on Friday afternoon. It will occur at the same time and place as the poster session. Come to peruse the posters and publications and to celebrate the work of members.

New Member and Student Breakfast is a meeting where new members are introduced and will have an opportunity to meet Board Members and Committee Chairs. Integrating Sex and Couple Therapy: A Clinical Exploration



Presenter: Tammy Nelson

This workshop will assist psychotherapists and marriage and family therapists in integrating sexuality counseling into their work with couples of all sexual orientations, utilizing a systemic framework. A couple's sex life throughout the lifespan of a relationship can include a wide range of positive integration, as well as physical and emotional dysfunction. Many times working on the sex life of a couple can mean a dramatic change in the rest of their lives. Many therapists have little or no

training in working with couples to improve their sex life, increase passion in long-term relationships or assist couples in recovering from infidelity or sexual compulsion. Issues around sex addiction, Internet and pornography use, affairs and infidelity, and open marriage will be addressed. This workshop will include direct interventions for couples of all sexual orientations to facilitate erotic recovery and a deeper, more rewarding intimacy and connection.

Tammy Nelson, Ph.D. is a Board Certified Sexologist, an AASECT certified Sex Therapist, a Diplomate of the American Board of Sexology, a Licensed Professional Counselor, a Certified Imago Therapist, an Advanced Clinician in Imago Relationship therapy, an Imago workshop presenter, a Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor and a Registerd Art Therapist. She is the author of several books including, "Getting the Sex You Want; Shed Your Inhibitions and Reach New Heights of Passion Together" as well as "What's Eating You? A Workbook for Anorexia and Bulimia." She has been a featured expert in Glamour Magazine, Cosmopolitan, Men's Health and a source in Time Magazine. She has written for Psychotherapy Networker and other trade journals as well as several other major websites. Dr. Nelson gives workshops and seminars and trains therapists around the world on issues relating to sex and relationships.

The Emergence of New Family Forms: Research on LGBT Families and Implications for Practice

Presenter: Abbie Goldberg



LGBTQ-parent families are incredibly diverse with respect to family formation (e.g., whether they were formed via alternative insemination, adoption, surrogacy, or after heterosexual divorce), race, class, and other dimensions. This workshop will draw from empirical research to address both the practical and symbolic challenges faced by LGBTQ-parent families, with special attention to issues such as: decision-making regarding the use of known versus unknown donors; the unique challenges of adoptive parent families (e.g., as a function of racial/ethnic diversity, and unequal

legal relationships within the family); challenges encountered by same-sex couples who separate in the absence of a legal "divorce"; and the unique concerns of individuals who identify as "second-gen" (i.e., LGBTQ young adults with LGBTQ parents). The objectives of this workshop are: 1) to understand the nuances of research findings on LGBTQ-parent families; 2) to apply these research findings to practice with and treatment of LGBTQ-parent families; and 3) to learn about practical resources that may inform your work with LGBTQ-parent families.

Abbie E. Goldberg, Ph.D., received her doctorate in clinical psychology from the University of Massachusetts Amherst and completed her predoctoral internship at Yale Medical School. She is currently an assistant professor of psychology at Clark University, where she has been since 2005. She is the author of over 30 peer-reviewed journal articles as well as the book, Lesbian and Gay Parents and Their Children: Research on the Family Life Cycle, which in 2010 received the Distinguished Book Award from Division 44 of the American Psychological Association. She has received grant funds from a variety of sources, including the National Institutes of Health, the American Psychological Foundation, the Williams Institute, and the Gay and Lesbian Medical Association. Dr. Goldberg has also served as a consultant to many organizations, including the Human Rights Campaign and COLAGE: People with a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender or Queer Parent.

The New York Times wrote of the 2008 production at Lincoln Center: "Building on time-honored traditions within gay and Jewish humor, Mr. Rudnick turns stereotypes into bullet-deflecting armor and jokes into an inexhaustible supply of ammunition...Frivolity for his characters is a solid existential choice in a threatening universe." PRIDE AND JOY was originally produced at the Tribeca Theater Festival in Association with the Drama Deptartment and is presented by special arrangement with Dramatists Play Service, Inc., New York.



Anne Bernstein, Ph.D., is in private practice as a family psychologist and mediator. A professor at the Wright Institute since 1981, she is the associate editor for the website of Family Process and the author of Flight of the Stork: What Children Think (and When) about Sex and Family Building, and Yours, Mine, and Ours: How Families Change when Remarried Parents Have a Child Together, as well as articles and chapters in books and professional journals. An AFTA charter member—and former Vice President, Treasurer and Board Member, Dr. Bernstein is on the Expert Council

of the National Stepfamily Resource Center, an Advanced Practitioner Mediator with the Association for Conflict Resolution, and a Fellow in Family Psychology and in Media Psychology of the American Psychological Association. At the turn of the millenium, she picked up where she left off before entering the Ph.D. program in psychology at the University of California-Berkeley, and resumed working as an actor (under another name). She has not given up her "day job."



Lisa Bowleg – Sexual Healing: Flipping the Script on Sexuality, Identity, and Risk Through the Prism of Black LGBTQ's Lives

Somewhere, on the edge of consciousness, there is what I call a mythical norm, which each one of us within our hearts knows "that is not me." In America, this norm is usually defined as white, thin, male, young, heterosexual, Christian, and financially secure. It is with this mythical norm that the trappings of power reside within this society. —Audre Lorde

In a radical departure from perceiving sexuality through the prism of what Black lesbian feminist poet Audre Lorde called the "mythic norm," the goal of this presentation is to place non-mythic sexuality, namely that of ethnic minority lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBTQ) people at the center rather than the periphery of inquiry. Informed by theory and research conducted with Black LGBTQ people and framing minority sexuality within a positive psychology framework, the goals of this presentation are to examine the intersectionality of social identities such as race, gender, socioeconomic status, and sexual identity, and discuss the implications on sexuality for couple and family therapy.

Lisa Bowleg is an Associate Professor in the Department of Community Health and Prevention at the School of Public Health of Drexel University in Philadelphia, PA. Her research, publications, and presentation focus on: (1) intersectionality, stress and resilience in the lives of Black, lesbian, gay bisexual and transgendered people; and (2) the effects of structural factors (e.g., racism, poverty, incarceration, unemployment), gender roles, and sexual scripts on HIV risk among Black heterosexual women and men.

She is currently the Principal Investigator of a National Institutes of Health-funded R01 focused on how structural factors, masculinity ideologies, and sexual scripts increase and reduce HIV risk in Black heterosexual men. Her most recent award is the 2008 Red Ribbon Award for Research from the Community Advisory Board of the Center for AIDS Research at the University of Pennsylvania. She is a member of the Behavioral and Social Consequences of HIV/AIDS Study Section of the National Institutes of Health, and a member of the American Public Health Association, the American Psychological Association, and a former Chair of the APA's Committee on Psychology and AIDS.



Rhea V. Almeida, MS, Ph.D., founder of IFS, is a family therapist, trainer and educator. Creator of the Cultural Context Model, a Liberation Based Healing Perspective, Dr. Almeida is the author of numerous journal articles and three books: Expansions of Feminist Theory Through Diversity, Transformations in Gender and Race: Family and Developmental Perspectives and co-author of Transformative Family Therapy: Just Families in a Just Society. She serves on the boards of numerous peer review journals and is acknowledged internationally and nationally for her work on Intersectionality -in therapeutic and policy practices. Her current work focuses on subjugating the standpoint of cultural competency.

In 2005 she received the American Family Therapy Academy Distinguished Award for Innovative Contributions to Family Therapy. For her cutting edge work in Liberation Based Healing, Dr. Almeida has been invited to expand scholarship in Ecuador, Jamaica, India, Sweden, South Africa, and the United States. She has provided consultation and training to educational institutions, human service agencies and businesses. She has been featured in the Los Angles Times, CNBC, National Public Radio, USA Today, and Pure Oxygen.

Dr. Almeida is the first appointee as a practitioner to the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) Council on Racial, Ethnic and Cultural Diversity (CRECD).

Rebecca Harvey is a Professor of Marriage and Family Therapy and Program Director at Seton Hill University near Pittsburgh, PA. She was a founding group leader in what has become the Q Center at AIDS Community Resource in Syracuse, New York, where she won numerous awards for her advocacy on behalf of LGBTQ youth and their families. In 2005 she co-authored *Nurturing Queer Youth: Family Therapy Transformed*. Rebecca Harvey maintains a private practice specializing in sexuality and is an AAMFT Clinical Member and Approved Supervisor. She is

especially proud of her newest identity, being an out mom.

Elijah Nealy – The Man in the Mirror: Reflections on Authenticity and Visibility in the Clinical Relationship

Five years ago, Eli Nealy began sharing his intention to gender transition with his clients. What followed was sometimes humorous, sometimes serious, for both clinician and clients. In this presentation, Eli Nealy examines the range of the

transference and counter-transferential issues that emerged. In virtually all cases, the conversation regarding sex/gender/gender identity and expression was engaged on new levels. Through the lens of these experiences, Eli will also reflect on the power of authenticity and visibility in the clinical relationship and what these qualities of radical presence demand from us as family therapists.

Rev. Elijah C. Nealy, M.Div., LCSW, is an out transgender man with over 25 years experience as a clinician, trainer and consultant around LGBT concerns in both pastoral and social service settings. He is the former director of adolescent & adult mental health services at the LGBT Community Center in NYC, and also served as the Center's Deputy Executive Director. Rev. Nealy currently teaches adjunct at Columbia University School of Social Work and at the Institute for Contemporary Psychotherapy. In his private practice, he specializes in gender identity concerns with youth, adults, and families, as well as seeing individuals and couples around a wide range of other life issues. Rev. Nealy is the proud father of two amazing young adults and one feisty six-year old.



Ken Corbett - Boyhood as Transformative Nexus

Boyhoods are found and made within a variety of families, parent-child relations, and within a host of registers. As a result, a social, symbolic, psychological, and biological nexus of "boy" is formed. This transformative nexus sometimes holds the promise of variety. But, more often boys are caught in a web of anxious normative regulation. Seeking to understand what might be made, found, lost, and buried in these transformations, Dr. Corbett will consider the lives of boys who wish to be girls.

Ken Corbett is a Clinical Assistant Professor at the New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis, Dr. Corbett will be speaking of a new psychology of masculinity, based in feminist and queer theories, that examines male development and the interrelationship between the body, the family, and the culture. Dr. Corbett examines the roles that parental and cultural anxiety play in development, and argues for a more nuanced approach to cross-gendered fantasy and experience. One that does not mistake social consensus for well-being.



Nancy Gambescia – Bridging the Gap between Couple and Sex Therapy: The Intersystem Approach

Many couples' therapists refer to a "specialist" for the treatment of sexual issues. While sexual material can be confusing, incongruous, paradoxical, and weird, it is the responsibility of the therapist to create a safe environment for the discussion of all aspects of sex, gender, and intimacy, regardless of complexity. Fragmenting treatment inadvertently promotes pessimism in many of our clients. The Intersystem Approach

is a comprehensive, integrative paradigm encompassing all facets of the psychotherapy experience including bio-psycho, social-cultural, individual-relational, and environmental perspectives.

As the science of sexuality evolves, we are learning more about gender differences in the sexual response and fluidity regarding sexual thoughts, feelings and behaviors. This presentation challenges the therapist to examine hypotheses about sexuality, variance, gender, normalcy, pathology, and other presuppositions influencing treatment.

Nancy Gambescia, Ph.D., R.N., maintains a private practice specializing in individuals, family relationships, and sex therapy. She teaches and supervises psychotherapists in the treatment of relational and sexual issues. Dr. Gambescia is a clinical associate of Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania School Of Medicine and the director of the post-graduate clinical program in Sex Therapy at Council for Relationships, Philadelphia, PA.

Dr. Gambescia is an approved supervisor and clinical member of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapy, Society for Sex Therapy and Research, and a certified sexologist and diplomate of the American Board of Sexology. Dr. Gambescia has coauthored four books: *Erectile Dysfunction*, *Hypoactive Sexual Desire*, *Treating Infidelity*, and *Systemic Sex Therapy* and several journal articles and chapters in textbooks which focus on relationship and sexual issues. She completed her clinical training at the Council for Relationships and her doctorate at the University of Pennsylvania.

Virtual Worlds: Technology and Family Life

Moderator: Peter Fraenkel



Peter Fraenkel, Ph.D., is Associate Professor of Clinical Psychology, The City College of the City University of New York; and Director, Ackerman Institute's Center for Time, Work, and the Family, which includes empirically-supported, community-based programs for families facing the challenges of homelessness, domestic violence, and immigration. Dr. Fraenkel is the author of *Sync Your Relationship, Save Your Marriage: Four Steps to Geeting Back on Track*, co-author of publications on work and family, collaborative community-based family programs, integrative approaches to systemic therapy, and child sexual

abuse. Along with Marcia Sheinberg and Fiona True, he received the 2004 American Family Therapy Academy's Award for Distinguished Contribution to Family Therapy Theory and Practice for their work on family-based treatment of incest. He is a former member of the Board of Directors and is an Advisory Editor for the journal *Family Process*, a Contributing Editor for the *The Psychotherapy Networker*, and past Vice President of AFTA.

Presenters: Thomas Blume, Gonzalo Bacigalupe & Eve Shapiro



Thomas Blume – Toto, I think We Are Not in the 20th Century Anymore

Technology has moved into family life at an incredible page—we are working

Technology has moved into family life at an incredible pace—we are working with Cyborg families, part human and part electronic. Client talk is augmented with text messages, voicemail and video clips, e-books, iPads, Playstations and Facebook pages. The Silicon Brick Road will take participants on a tour of an exotic world of social networking, screenshots, and avatars, where digital natives speak a new language in which many therapists are not literate. We will visit Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and Second Life. In the process, we will explore ways in which

these technologies are changing relationships for couple partners, parents and children, grandparents and grandchildren. We will identify strategies for making technology a partner in our work.

Thomas W. Blume, Ph.D., moved into the family therapy field from the nursery school classroom, where he discovered that parents generally had more power than 4-year-olds. Over the years his clinical practice has focused on adult couples and families with adolescents, with a special interest in families who are somewhere on the union dissolution/recoupling/family reconfiguration spectrum. Technology is a long-term interest; he was the kid who threaded the teacher's film strip projector in 1955, and he has found that 21st Century blended families are redefining the meaning of "We have communication problems." Formerly the Director of the Addiction Studies Institute at the University of Detroit Mercy, he is Associate Professor of Counseling and Coordinator of the Couple and Family Specialization at Oakland University in Michigan, and author of *Becoming a Family Counselor: A Bridge to Family Theory and Practice.* He is Chair of the Family Therapy Section for the National Council on Family Relations for 2010-2012.



Gonzalo Bacigalupe – Virtualizing Intimacy: Emerging Media and Family Connections

Information communication technologies, an omnipresent dimension of family life, have been welcome and despised in the clinical, research, and traditional media. Our ambivalent relationship with emerging technology is not new but social technologies challenge long-standing assumptions about interpersonal communication, identity, intimacy, and the therapist's role. Through a critical review of the literature, a review

of my recent research interviewing teenagers and family clinicians, clinical, and consultation vignettes, this presentation explores the adoption of technology by families, as well as the untapped opportunities for furthering our clinical work.

Gonzalo Bacigalupe, EdD, MPH, is Ikerbasque Research Professor with the Basque Foundation for Science, with University of Deusto Bilbao; Associate Professor, Family Therapy Program, Department of Counseling & School Psychology, College of Education and Human Development, University of Massachusetts Boston and was Senior Fulbright Research Fellow in 2006 at the Autonomic University of Barcelona. His research focuses on the impact of social technologies, family health and e-health and, interpersonal violence. He is collaborating in a longitudinal study of adolescent depression in the Basque Country. Dr. Bacigalupe is Associate Editor and Photography Editor of the Family Systems & Health and member of several editorial boards including the *Journal of Marital & Family Therapy* and *Qualitative Research in Psychology*. He serves as elected Councilor of the American Public Health Association International Section, Vice-President for Public Interest & Diversity of the Society for Family Psychology, and advisor to the APA Presidential Task Force on Immigration.



Eve Shapiro – Gendered Bodies in a Technological Age

Gendered bodies are shaped and reshaped by contemporary information and biomedical technologies. While contemporary cultural debates center on whether technologies are moving us closer toward utopian or dystopian lives, the lived experiences of individuals and families point to complex and contradictory processes. Making sense of technology and embodiment by theorizing technology and gender together, however, highlights the historical and context-specific processes at play. In

this talk I will examine how new information technologies are being used by individuals and families to engage in identity-based advocacy and narrative identity processes. I also explore the opportunities and constraints offered by new technologies for individuals, families, and communities. Toward this end I will draw on several case studies of collective advocacy and identity development (transgender organizing and debates about the DSM) as well as individual and family identity formation (transgender identity and embodiment work online).

Eve Shapiro, Ph.D., is assistant professor of sociology at Westfield State University. She received her Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of California, Santa Barbara and has published in a number of journals including *Gender & Society, Sexualities*, and the *Journal of Gay and Lesbian Social Services*. Her recent book, *Gender Circuits: Bodies and Identities in a Technological Age* examines whether and how new technologies are changing the gendered lives of cisgender and transgender individuals. Extending this, Dr. Shapiro's current research examines the myriad ways information technologies can be agentically used to reshape individual and community lives, particularly around gender and sexuality. In addition, Dr. Shapiro is a frequent participant and facilitator for LGBTQ social justice and campus/workplace climate trainings at college and community events.

Sex and Gender: From the Edge to the Center

Joan Laird is Professor Emerita from the Smith College School for Social Work, where she chaired the human behavior sequence, edited the Smith Studies, and taught family theory and therapy, sociocultural concepts, and electives on ritual, sex, gender, and LGBTQ themes. She co-founded Ann Arbor Center for the Family, a practice, training, and education center, and has written or edited 5 books and over 60 articles.

Caitlin Ryan – Critical Role of Families in Reducing Risk & Promoting Well-being for their LGBT Children

This session will discuss findings, approaches, and resources for increasing family and caregiver support for LGBT youth and young adults based on research from the Family Acceptance Project (FAP) — the first research, intervention, education and policy initiative to help ethnically and religiously diverse families decrease rejection and increase support for their LGBT children. FAP research shows that family acceptance promotes well-being and protects against risk, while

family rejection predicts serious health and mental health problems for LGBT young people, including depression, illegal drug use, suicidal ideation and attempts, HIV risk and ejection from the home. FAP is developing an evidence-based family model of wellness, prevention and care to promote healthy futures for LGBT youth.

Caitlin Ryan, Ph.D., ACSW, is a clinical social worker who has worked on LGBTQ health and mental health issues since the 1970s. Her work has been recognized by many groups, including the National Association of Social Workers which named her "Social Worker of the Year" for her early contributions to the AIDS epidemic; UCSF's Lesbian Health & Research Center which named her "Researcher of the Year" for pioneering work in lesbian health research; and the American Psychological Association, Division 44 which gave her the Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award for critical research on LGBT youth and families. In 2002, she started the Family Acceptance Project, a research, intervention, education and policy initiative to help ethnically and religiously diverse families decrease rejection and increase support for their LGBT children to reduce serious health risks and to promote their well-being.



Richard Sprott – Listening to the Alternative Sex Margins: Experiences of Stigma and Healing in Therapy with BDSM and Polyamorous Couples and Families

Approximately 10-15% of people express alternative forms of sexuality and consensual non-monogamy, across all sexual orientations, with a smaller number of people building identities and family structures around these alternative sexualities and relationship orientations. A few studies suggest that approximately

40-50% of these people never disclose to a therapist or counselor the nature of their relationships, if they seek out mental health services. Using community-based participatory research models, we are beginning to see the outlines of what might constitute "cultural competency" in working with people who are polyamorous and/or kinky in their sexual expressions. This presentation will outline the challenges and the lessons learned which have the greatest impact on how therapists work with alternative sex clients, and what lessons might be applied to therapy for all.

Richard Sprott, Ph.D., received his doctorate in Developmental Psychology from UC Berkeley in 1994. He currently is Executive Director of CARAS – Community-Academic Consortium for Research on Alternative Sexualities. CARAS is dedicated to the support and promotion of excellence in the study of alternative sexualities, and the dissemination of research results to members of alternative sexuality and research communities and to the general public. Being a community-based research organization, the focus of CARAS depends on partnerships and the involvement of different alt-sex communities, with an emphasis on alt-sex communities that are currently ignored or understudied, such as BDSM and polyamory.



David Wohlsifer, Ph.D., LCSW, is a partner with Bala Psychological Resources in Bala Cynwyd, PA. Dr. Wohlsifer is on the faculties of Bryn Mawr College, Graduate School of Social Work, and the University of Pennsylvania's School of Medicine, Psychiatric Residency. His areas of expertise include individual, couple, and family therapy. Prior to being in private practice he was the Co-Director of the Center for Sexual Abuse Survivors, at the Center for Cognitive Therapy of the University of Pennsylvania. He has co-authored several book chapters on sexual issues and is an associate editor for the journal *Family Process*. He received his MSW from the University of Pennsylvania & has a Ph.D. in Human Sexuality.

1. Teaching Undergraduate and Graduate Family Therapy

Chairs: Marsha Mirkin & Jodie Kliman

This interest group will continue last year's format of sharing ideas, syllabi, and other methods of helping undergraduates and graduate students conceptualize and practice family therapy and social justice skills. Through discussion of effective and engaging assignments, articles, experiential exercises, internships, and classroom discussion topics, members will develop a broader repertoire of ideas for teaching family therapy at undergraduate and graduate levels.

2. Racial Domination and Privilege

Authentic dialogue across difference is difficult. The facilitators invite past participants and new registrants to co-construct the interest group meeting in advance to maximize productive exchange in a safe context; the group will be designed by the committee of the whole, guided by our common humanity. The mission of the group is to explore the challenges of collaborative examination of our collective and individual accountability for unintended expressions of racism, in teaching, treatment, and within our AFTA community. 3. Community-Based Family Programs and Consultation Chairs: Peter Fraenkel & Paulette Hines

Home-Based and Larger Systems Interventions: Beyond the Therapy Room

This year the Interest Group will afford participants the opportunity to talk about their work outside the therapy office in two contexts: conducting home-based family therapy, and consulting to organizations/larger systems that are striving to transform themselves into more culturally proficient entities. The group will engage in a dialogue about the challenges of doing this work in the current environment, lessons learned, resources, and issues ripe for evaluation/research. To start us off, Norma

Scarborough will describe her experiences with home-based therapy, and Nydia Garcia-Preto will describe her work consulting to agencies and other larger systems.

4. Evaluating Poststructural Therapies (also called Evaluating Postmodern / Narrative / Constructionist Therapies)

Chairs: Michael Ungar, Victoria Dickerson & Carmen Knudson-Martin

Constructing evidence-based research (a structural approach) for poststructuralist therapies presents a daunting dilemma. This is the 3rd year for this interest group. In the 1st meeting the group looked at traditional research vs. out-of-the-box approaches. In the 2nd meeting the group explored the statement: "If you know it when you see it, you can code it." In this meeting, the group will examine the experience of one clinical research team in developing a coding approach for their constructionist model of therapy. The group, headed by **Carmen Knudson-Martin** at Loma Linda University, is doing a task analysis of their SERT model for couple therapy. Analysis focuses on identifying change events where a gendered social discourse is present and then coding sequences of what therapists and clients do that either reinforce the discourse or create something different. Discussion following the video illustrations will focus on challenges in creating such a coding scheme and the postmodern issues involved in using it for outcome research.

5. Murray Bowen: The Man and the Theory Chairs: Sally Eisen Miller & Carolyn Moynihan-Bradt

Clinicians, teachers and researchers of Bowen theory have diverse interests. **Kent Webb**, MSW, has chosen for his clinical research "Understanding Male Homosexuality." From a family systems perspective, Kent examines the homosexual population in his clinical practice from a familial, social, and historical perspective. He looks at the role of anxiety in functionality in the family and in society. The research will be presented and discussed. Dr. Bowen will also be present on DVD.

6. Integrative Couple and Family Therapy Chairs: **Jay Lebow & Doug Breunlin**

The integrative interest group focuses on efforts to integrate the various approaches, strategies, and techniques in couple and family therapy. This year's group will feature a presentation by **Doug Breunlin** presenting the Meta-frameworks Problem Centered integrative model developed at the Family Institute at Northwestern over the last two decades. Doug's presentation will be followed by an open discussion about integrative methods of practice.

7. Masculinities: Revisiting Men's Issues in the 21st Century Chairs: Robert Garfield & David Wohlsifer

This interest group will focus on ideas, clinical work, and research related to men's issues and their applicability to family therapy. We will discuss clinical issues around engaging men in individual, couples, family and group therapy. Men's issues will be examined from a multicultural perspective taking into account class, culture, race, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, and the intersection these dynamics may have on the lives of men. The importance of male intimacy and friendship related to men's individual health, relationships, and quality of life will also be addressed.

8. Training of Psychiatry Residents Chairs: Anne Fishel & John Sargent

This group is for those teaching family therapy to either adult or child psychiatry residents. We will discuss our experiences in establishing teaching programs in settings where there are competing demands on residents' training time. We will share effective and compelling techniques, as well as sequences of seminars, for teaching family therapy when time is limited, and biological modalities may be dominant. We will also discuss the teaching of family interventions across the many settings where residents work, like inpatient and consultation services. We would also like to pay attention to the ways that teachers have found to inspire residents to continue in their training in family therapy in post-residency years, and how to engage the next generation of family therapists.

9. Pregnancy

An Often Neglected Area of the Couple's Experience: Pregnancy, Delivery, and the Following Months

What is left unaddressed in this approach is the influence of patriarchy or how power and privilege inherently reside with one member of the couple and leaves the other with less authority. A narrative approach seeks to make visible the power relations that operate on both heterosexual and same-sex couples. A series of exercises will invite the participants to notice the invisible operations of power, and a video demonstration will show some ways to address this with couples.

15. Meeting Heteronormativity Head On Chairs: Gene Gardino & Kimberly Flemke

Everyone along the entire sexual identity continuum are encouraged to attend this interest group, which will explore societal messages of heteronormativity and the cumulative effects that these messages have on LGBTQ individuals across the lifespan. While most LGBTQ individuals are keenly aware of microaggressions that occur regularly, many feel left without a voice to counteract these almost daily encounters. Time will be spent discussing the unintentional impact that heterosexuals potentially have on their LGBTQ colleagues, friends, family, and clients. Some concrete strategies will be offered for helping strengthen the individual LGBTQ voices in the face of perceived and real invisibility.

16. Technology and Relationships

Chairs: Peter Fraenkel & Anne Fishel

This group will provide an opportunity to discuss the wide range of challenges and opportunities at the interface between technology and human relationships. Hardware such as mobile smart phones, computers, large panel televisions, and their wide-ranging software applications provide ever-expanding access to persons and information, and these developments can enhance or disrupt connection and power relationships depending on how they are used and by whom. This year, the group will provide an opportunity to extend the discussion started in the plenary on technology, and will set an agenda for further meetings of the group at AFTA and in cyberspace between conferences.


Purpose: To bring interested members of AFTA together in a supportive setting where we can speak from our hearts to explore, share and transform our personal and professional experiences of gender. Regardless of whether you have ever attended the Men's or Women's Institute, please join us in this unique forum for deepening our connections.

History: When AFTA sought to address issues of sexism, discussions within the broader organization often reflected the cultural tensions occurring in larger society as assumptions and identities were challenged. The Women's and Men's Institutes were created to allow separate conversations exploring emotional intimacy, power, family, and other topics relevant to how gender plays out in our professional and personal lives. The process sometimes has been painful and, simultaneously, has created the possibility for authentic transformation and inclusion. We are hoping that this Institute will provide another opportunity for continuing to expand our experience of gender by renewing and advancing the conversation amongst all of us.

Format: Small, self-selected groups will provide an opportunity for safe and confidential sharing. The facilitated discussion will focus on "transformative moments" in our lives: the personal and cultural histories that have shaped our thinking and behavior around gender and how the ways we "do gender" have evolved over time. Sharing these experiences will help us to deconstruct the binary designations "male/female" and "masculine/feminine" and to expand our understanding of the expression and enactment of multiple dimensions of gender in ourselves and others. Hopefully, the diversity represented within each small group will allow us to explore some of the intersections of age, race, ethnicity, sexual identity, religion, and class in the construction of our own experiences of gender.

The second portion of the evening will allow us to reconnect as a large community and hear from each small group as they reflect on the important themes and learning from their conversations. Finally, given that this experimental Gender Institute is being held for the first time, if time permits, we will open the conversation to hear reflections on the value of this format and ideas for planning of future Gender events.



18. Couple Therapy

Chairs: Corky Becker, Martha Edwards & Mona Fishbane

Exploring Power Dynamics in Couple Therapy

This year we will explore aspects of power dynamics in couple therapy. How are couple power dynamics affected by gender & culture? How can we work with power struggles and imbalances of power in the couple? How can we facilitate equality and mutual respect between partners? As "starter dough" for our conversation, **Carmen Knudson-Martin** will discuss her research on these issues and implications for clinical practice; **Mona Fishbane** will explore ways to facilitate relational empowerment in couple therapy, highlighting Power To and Power With perspectives that ameliorate some Power Over dynamics between partners.

19. Structuralism/Post-Structuralism: Locating the Practice in Family Therapy Chairs: Kilian Fritsch & John Brendler

How can we sharpen and delineate the connections between the real-time practice in specific family sessions with the larger conceptual schemas which underlie the practice? What are the connections between a structural approach to family therapy and the larger field of structuralism? Can a therapist practice both within a structuralist framework and also work to create newer "realities" which would qualify as post-structuralist within the meaning systems of the family itself? Our meeting will be a

continuation of a small group presentation in which these questions will have been introduced. We will re-watch videotaped segments of a consultation with a family where violence has established a foothold, looking particularly for examples of how our own experience of viewing and analyzing has undergone any change or enrichment as a result of our attempt to bring multiple voices into the discussion. This should appeal particularly to newer members who are involved in direct practice, and teachers who are working to help their students find pattern and meaning between practice and concepts.

20. Military Family Issues

Chair: Elaine Willerton

The needs, strengths and challenges of military and veteran families are evolving; impacted by military lifestyle, deployments, and the shifting political climate. Family therapists have a keen interest in understanding and helping service members and their parents, spouses and children. The Military Family Issues group serves as a forum to discuss the bubbling issues related to military families. We share information about working with these families in clinical, research and policy-related capacities and teaching about military families. The group will focus on best practices and multidisciplinary collaboration as well as emerging research and support services for military families.

21. Substance Abuse and the Family Chairs: Peter Steinglass & Judith Landau

Family therapy (FT) approaches for substance abuse (SA) disorders have come of age after many years of neglect. However, significant barriers remain dividing the FT and SA therapy communities, including often dramatically different views about how to handle the rehabilitation/recovery phase of treatment. Hence the focus for this year's meeting will be "families in recovery." We will use as a stepping off point for a larger discussion of the issues associated with this topic (including working with diverse populations), brief presentations of two programs explicitly designed for work with families in recovery—a short-term, multiple family discussion group (MFG) protocol (Steinglass); and the LIFE in Recovery protocol (Landau).

22. Film, Families, and Family Therapy: The Therapeutic Session Chair: Gonzalo Bacigalupe

The Film Interest Group has explored, in the past, subjects as diverse as ambiguous loss, the impact of technology, trauma, intercultural understanding, secrets and rituals, and family process, among others. This year we will focus on films that directly portray a therapy session. We will discuss brief film clips in which a therapy session is included or is core as in the case of the series "In Treatment." We will discuss the question of how films foster specific expectations about what should happen in therapy. We will also discuss the potential of these portrayals for training. For example, the therapeutic contract, common factors in couple and family therapy and the divergent narrative of clinicians and patients of what occurs in the therapy.

23. The Supervisory Relationship: Examining Power Relations Chairs: Jane Chiu, Laurie Markham, David Marsten, Duncan Wigg & Vicki Dickerson

The supervisor-supervisee relationship implies that knowledge resides with the supervisor who is in the position of knowing, while the supervisee is in the position of receiving knowledge. Many supervisory practices inadvertently support this division with the effect often being that supervisees

shave an experience of doubt and uncertainty. This interest group will demonstrate practices that address this power differential to assist supervisors in helping their supervisees more readily access their own knowledge and skills. Jane Chiu and Laurie Markham have written an article that demonstrates these ideas.

24. Transgendered Interest Group

Chair: Arlene Istar Lev

This is the first year for a Transgender Interest Group. As increasing numbers of people are seeking services for trans and gender-related concerns, often their family members have been ignored and marginalized. Some AFTA members have been leaders in writing and speaking about how to integrate family members (spouses, children, parents) into the trans identity process, while others have just begun to work with trans clients. The Transgender Interest Group is a place to explore clinical and teaching challenges related to trans issues, to offer support for those of us deemed "experts," as well as those just exploring work with this community.

25. The Narrative of the Therapist: Clinical Uses of Expressive Writing Chair: Robert Carroll

The Healing Power of Poetry in Clinical Practice

We all know the healing power of expressive writing in general and poetry in particular because it springs from us in times of need. After 9/11, poetry sprang up everywhere as a way of finding the words to express the inexpressible. Many of us have been moved to write journals, poems and letters to facilitate healing across personal and clinical situations. In this Interest Group we will look at the various ways in which poetry's power to heal, promote growth, and transform can be used clinically with individual, families, and in community. We will solicit healing anecdotes from participants regarding the ways in which they have utilized poetry, journaling and letters for themselves and in their clinical practices. Examples will be presented by the organizer.

FILM AND DISCUSSION: "NESHOBA: THE PRICE OF FREEDOM"

In this group we will view an outstanding new documentary film which weaves the tragic murders of the three civil rights workers in 1964 in Mississippi with a community's search for justice in the present. In 1964, a mob of Klansmen murdered three civil rights workers in the small Mississippi county of Neshoba. The young men, an African-American from Mississippi and two Jews from New York, were in the deep south helping to register African-American voters during "Freedom Summer." Although the killers bragged about what they did, it took the state of Mississippi 40 years to indict the mastermind, Edgar Ray Killen, an 80-year old Baptist preacher and notorious racist. "Neshoba: The Price of Freedom" tells the story of these three American heroes and the long struggle to bring their killers to justice in a place still dealing with the legacy of a violent and racist past.

We will follow the film with a conversation focused on the implications of family therapy training, research and practice informed by a commitment to social justice.

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
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
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

The discovery that a child is lesbian or gay can send shockwaves through a family. A mother will question how she's raised her son; a father will worry that his daughter will experience discrimination. Gay and lesbian youth fear their families will reject them and that they will lose financial and emotional support. All in all, learning a child is gay challenges long-held views about sexuality and relationships, and the resulting uncertainty can produce feelings of anger, resentment, and worry.

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Michael C. LaSala is director of the Master of Social Work Program and associate professor at Rutgers University. He has been in practice for more than twenty-five years and is a much-sought-after lecturer and researcher. He currently treats LGBT families and individuals at the Institute for Personal Growth in Highland Park, New Jersey, and his work can be found in Social Work, Family Process, Journal of Marital and Family Therapy, Families in Society, and Journal of Lesbian and Gay Social Services.

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My premise merely states that the human is a passenger on planet earth and that sometime in the future the human can clarify the difference between what the human is from what the human feels, imagines and says.
